
In the news

Net zero emissions law

Just in case you've missed it, the UK has become the first major economy to pass a *net zero emissions law*. The new target will require the UK to bring all greenhouse gas emissions to net zero by 2050.

Climate change emergency

The NHS as anchor institutions

The *NHS long-term plan* commented on the role of the NHS as an anchor institution¹. Anchor Institutions are large, typically non-profit organisations, that are able to influence the health and prosperity of their local populations through the way they operate. NHS England and NHS Improvement, together with the Health Foundation, are researching *anchor institutions*. They are currently determining whether their involvement goes further than showcasing best practice to potentially outlining an approach, or even an expectation, of how all NHS bodies should operate within their local communities.

Sustainable Development Unit (SDU)

The SDU is funded by, and accountable to, NHS England and Public Health England to work across the NHS, public health and social care system to embed and promote the three elements of sustainable development – environmental, social and financial.

They are currently finalising development of a *Sustainable healthcare dashboard* which will highlight key opportunities for change within the NHS, contributing to the sustainability targets of the *NHS long-term plan*.

Centre for Sustainable Healthcare (CSH)

The CSH provides strategic input and consultancy to national and local programmes including:

- sustainable specialities, designed to make clinical sustainability integral to the planning of health systems
- greenspace projects, such as their *green ward competition* which is designed to empower clinicians to make their daily practice more sustainable, and the *NHS Forest* focusing on the benefits of green space on or near to healthcare estates

The Prince's Accounting for Sustainability (A4S)

The *A4S* project was established by HRH The Prince of Wales in 2004. Its aim is to inspire action by finance leaders to drive a fundamental shift towards resilient business models and a sustainable economy. To do this, A4S has three core aims that underpin everything they do:

- · inspire finance leaders to adopt sustainable and resilient business models
- transform financial decision making to enable an integrated approach, reflective of the opportunities and risks posed by environmental and social issues
- scale up action across the global finance and accounting community.

The HFMA's Environmental Sustainability Special Interest Group

The HFMA's Environmental Sustainability Special Interest Group works to highlight good practice in embedding environmental and social sustainability in the NHS and the wide range of benefits this offers, including operating within safe financial and environmental limits, developing robust, resilient and future proof models of prevention and care.

The Group's membership includes representatives from provider and commissioner bodies in the NHS, as well as the Sustainable Development Unit (SDU), NHS England and NHS Improvement, the Prince's Accounting for Sustainability Project (A4S), the International Integrated Reporting Council (IIRC), and independent consultants.
